DISCUSSION (70 MINUTES)

I. "Schedule of Joyful Assignments" (pages 6-11) (10 minutes)

Please turn to the "Schedule of Joyful Assignments," pages 6-11. This is a 13-week study and is divided into five parts:

- 1) During weeks 1 and 2 we will cover the "Preliminaries" of this course. We will become oriented to the importance of this subject and the habits we need to establish.
- 2) During weeks 3 and 4, we will learn how to slow down and think about what we are reading. That is, we will learn how to *contemplate* the Scriptures.
- 3) During weeks 5, 6, and 7, we will learn how to *pray* through the Scriptures. We will see the importance of discussing the Word of God with the Author Himself.
- 4) During weeks 8 and 9, we will learn how to apply the Scriptures to our lives.
- 5) Then, during the rest of our time together, weeks 10-13, we will "Practice What We Have Learned." In the process we will see how our personal times of fellowship with the Lord can be used in a small group Bible study.

This schedule of assignments is designed to clearly communicate each week's readings. At the beginning of each meeting, I will ask one of you to read to the group the following week's assignment. This will orient us as to what we are to do for our next meeting.

[Call attention to Week 3 (page 6) / "Read 'Contemplating the Scriptures' again."]

The Pleasure of My Father's Fellowship is a skill course. When learning a skill, repetition is important. At times I will have you read a few of the pages twice. There is a reason for this. After we discuss the material, reading it again will cause that material to "gel" in your thinking. So, please do not consider this busy work. It is an important part of the learning process.

? Do you have any comments or questions about our "Schedule of Joyful Assignments"?

II. "From Discipline to Delight" (pages 12-13) (20 minutes)

[Have several read "From Discipline to Delight," pages 12-13]

This is not meant to embarrass anyone. Just keep in mind that the purpose of this study is to enhance our relationship with the Lord.

? With one word or with a short phrase, how would you describe your time of fellowship with the Lord? What is it *typically* like? Would you call it "healthy and robust"? Is it "satisfying"? Would you say it is one of the "highlights of your day"? Or perhaps it seems more like an "obligation." It's "routine." It's "boring." You might even say it is "non-existent." Be honest.

[Pause for their answers.]

? I'm also interested in what you do during your time with the Lord. Do you spend one hour each day reading the Bible and one hour in prayer? Do you read a devotional book of some kind? Do you listen to Christian music? Do you pray on the way to work? Or perhaps you do not spend any time at all in fellowship with the Lord.

[Give each student time to answer.]

III. "Foundation and Features" (pages 14-16) (35 minutes)

What I would like to do now is make sure we all understand the *foundation* upon which this course is based. This is found at the top of page 14.

[Have someone read "Foundation," page **14**.]

? Would someone explain – in your own words – these two basic beliefs?

"Comments, Questions, Clarifications?"

Listed on pages 14-16 are several features of this course.

[Have several read "Features," pages **14-16**]

"Comments, Questions, Clarifications?"

? I would like to ask the class if any one of these features captured your attention in some way ... something that stood out as being of special importance to you?

Turn to the bottom of page **16**. I would like to ask each of you to read your answer to the question, "What do you hope to gain from this study?"

[Have each student read his answer.]

IV. Conclusion (5 minutes)

Before we dismiss, does anyone have any concluding comments or questions?

DISCUSSION (70 MINUTES)

I. "Those Who Stand to Benefit from *Your* Time in God's Word" (pages 17-18) (10 minutes)

Most surely, you want your own life to be changed by the time you spend with the Lord. But what about others? On pages 17-18 three groups of people were mentioned that also stand to benefit from *your* time in God's Word: your family, your church, and those who make up your world.

[Have several read "Those Who Stand to Benefit from *Your* Time in God's Word," pages **17-18**]

? When you were reading these pages, was there one group in particular that made you say, "Yes, those are the ones I would really like to see impacted by my time in the Word and prayer"?

[As they answer this question, make sure they comment on *how* they want their lives to be impacted.]

Let us not miss the point: this is not an insignificant investment you are making. It is an investment in eternity itself.

II. "A Word (or Two) to the Wise" (pages 19-20) (10 minutes)

On pages 19-20 you read a section entitled "A Word (or Two) to the Wise."

[Have several read "A Word (or Two) to the Wise," pages 19-20]

- ? Why is it important that you begin your time with the Lord in *prayer*? [The Spirit of God is the only One Who knows the thoughts of God (1st Corinthians 2:11-12). We are, therefore, dependent upon Him to properly understand God's Word. Each time we approach His Word, we need to ask the Holy Spirit to be our Teacher.]
- ? Why is it important that you draw near to your heavenly Father *each day*? Why so frequently? [We are going to be bombarded by this world's false philosophies every day. We, therefore, need to expose ourselves to God's Truth as much as possible to know how to respond to these lies.]

? Why is it important for you to establish a consistent *time and place* for Bible reading? [So that it does not get lost in the shuffle of the myriads of activities that crowd into our lives each day.]

The idea of this section is this: your time with the Lord needs to be **deliberate**.

III. "First Things First" / "A Group Study" (pages 21-22) (25 minutes)

[Have two persons read "First Things First" and "A Group Study," pages 21-22]

The questions that you were to answer on page 21 are designed to get these Bible study habits into your daily schedule and practice.

[Ask each student the following two questions:]

? ______, what is your intended schedule (what time will you begin and where will you be)?

? ______, do you foresee yourself having any problems maintaining this schedule?

IV. "Contemplating the Scriptures" (pages 23-25) (15 minutes)

Let's look now at pages 23-25, "Contemplating the Scriptures."

[With each problem, turn the solution over to the group.]

[Have several read "Contemplating the Scriptures," pages 23-25]

? According to this schedule, what is the first step we should take before we begin that day's reading? [Begin each day of Bible reading with prayer.]

We have already mentioned why this is so important. We cannot accurately understand the Word of God unless the Spirit of God gives us that ability. It is also true that the power of God is needed for our lives to be conformed to the image of Christ.

- ? According to this schedule, what is the second step we should take? [Read one (or more) chapters from the Bible.]
- ? Having read one or more chapters, what question are you to ask yourself? (This is step three.) ["What is the one Truth that stands out the most to me from this chapter(s)?"]

With step four you are to write out your answer to this question.

? What reason was given for doing that? Why not just walk out the door and think about it? [(1) As soon as we walk out the door, we could easily be distracted from thinking about this truth. (2) Our thoughts are better articulated when we must put them into words. (3) Writing gives us time to absorb the thought. (4) You will also have a written record of your thoughts.]

V. Selecting a Gospel (5 minutes)

We will begin our study of the Scriptures by reading through one of the four Gospels. The Gospel we use will be selected by this small group. Please take a piece of paper, write the Gospel you prefer to read, and pass your votes to me. I can tell you in just a few minutes which one the majority prefers.

[Announce the result.]

We will, therefore, be following Appendix B, Schedule (A, B, C, or D), page (58, 59, 60, or 61).

VI. Conclusion (5 minutes)

Before we dismiss, does anyone have any concluding comments or questions about this approach to having a daily time of fellowship with your heavenly Father?

DISCUSSION (70 MINUTES)

I. "Appendix A: The Unique Features of Our Reading Schedules" (pages 56-57)

"Appendix B: Daily Bible Reading Schedules (4)" (pages 58-61) (5 minutes)

[Have several read "Appendix A: The Unique Features of Our Reading Schedules," pages **56-57**]

I do not want to rush by these features without giving you an opportunity to comment on them.

? Do you have any thoughts or questions regarding any of these features?

There are many fine Bible reading programs available. For our purposes, we will be using the "Daily Bible Reading Schedule" on page ____ (58-61), which means we will start with the Gospel of _____. Any one of these four schedules will expose us to the various kinds of literature found in God's Word:

- **narrative**: history from *The Gospels*
- wisdom: poetry from *The Psalms*
- **wisdom**: life's principles from *Proverbs*
- **legal**: a code of laws from *Exodus*
- **instructional (didactic)**: doctrine and morality from 1st Thessalonians
- **prophetic (apocalyptic)**: prophecy from *The Revelation*

II. Review: "Contemplating the Scriptures" (pages 23-25) (5 minutes)

Last week we were introduced to an approach we will be using to help us meditate upon the Scriptures. And throughout last week, we applied this method to (Matthew **or** Mark **or** Luke **or** John), chapters 1-5. Before we discuss our key thoughts, I would like for us to briefly review the process we used.

? _____, using your own words, would you review for the group the different steps we will use to help us meditate upon the Scriptures? (This can be found on pages 23-24.)

[Begin each day of Bible reading with prayer.

Read one chapter (or more) from the Bible.

As you read, ask yourself, "What is the one Truth that stands out the most to me from this chapter(s)?"

At the top of a new page, record this key thought in your journal.]

III. Discussion of Our Key Thoughts (55 minutes)

Let's now discuss our "key thoughts for the week."

- 1) The first thing you should do is to read the verse or cluster of verses from which you will comment.
- 2) Then read your key thought from that passage.
- 3) [To the group] After he presents his key thought, you will all have an opportunity to make your own comments about that same passage. We have all read it; so, we should all be familiar with it.
- 4) I would encourage you to write down any thoughts mentioned by someone else that you would like to remember.

[Ask each person to report on his / her "key thought for the week."]

[Watch the clock! Pace the discussion according to the time you have.]

IV. Conclusion (5 minutes)

? Does anyone have any concluding comments or questions?

DISCUSSION (70 MINUTES)

I. Evaluation (10 minutes)

You have now invested two weeks learning how to thoughtfully listen to your Father's counsel through a careful reading of His Word.

? What do you think so far about this approach? Do you have any comments, or questions, or problems?

[Turn each problem over to the group to solve.]

II. Discussion of Our Key Thoughts (55 minutes)

Let's now discuss our "key thoughts for the week."

- 1) The first thing you should do is to read the verse or cluster of verses from which you will comment.
- 2) Then read your key thought from that passage.
- To the group After he presents his key thought, you will all have an opportunity to make your own comments about that passage.
- 4) I would encourage you to write down any thoughts mentioned by someone else that you would like to remember.

[Ask each person to report on his / her "key thought for the week."]

[Watch the clock! Pace the discussion according to the time you have.]

III. Conclusion (5 minutes)

? Does anyone have any concluding comments or questions?

DISCUSSION (70 MINUTES)

I. "Praying through the Scriptures" (pages 26-28) (15 minutes)

Each day we have read one (or more) chapters from the Bible. We have asked ourselves the question, "What is the one truth that stands out the most to me from this chapter(s)?" And we have recorded our answer to that question in our journal.

Dear friends, the next step we take will be the most important thing we do all day.

[Have several read "Praying through the Scriptures," pages 26-28]

"Comments, Questions, Clarifications?"

The most important thing we can do each day, after spending time in God's Word, is to discuss with our heavenly Father the counsel we just received from Him. But before we do, we need to prepare our hearts for this encounter with almighty God.

- ? Why is it important to approach the throne of God with a reverent, respectful confidence? [Reverence and respect because *He is worthy* to be paid such homage. Confidence, because *He is worthy* to be believed.]
- ? Why should we use the Word of God to guide us as we pray? How does its content its words help us pray with expectation? [The better we know God's character and works, the better we know what He is able do. The better we know God's promises and commands, the better we know what He is willing to do. These assurances of God, as revealed in His Word, strengthen our faith, causing us to pray with confidence.]

[Have someone read 1st John 5:14-15]

THIS IS THE **CONFIDENCE** WHICH WE HAVE BEFORE HIM, THAT, IF WE ASK **ANYTHING ACCORDING TO HIS WILL, HE HEARS US.** AND IF WE KNOW THAT HE HEARS US IN WHATEVER WE ASK, WE

KNOW THAT WE HAVE THE REQUESTS WHICH WE HAVE ASKED FROM HIM. (1ST JOHN 5:14-15)

II. Discussion of Our Key Thoughts (50 minutes)

Let's now discuss our "key thoughts for the week."

- 1) The first thing you should do is to read the verse or cluster of verses from which you will comment.
- 2) Then read your key thought from that passage.
- 3) [To the group] After he presents his key thought, you will all have an opportunity to make your own comments about that passage.
- 4) I would encourage you to write down any thoughts mentioned by someone else that you would like to remember.

[Ask each person to report on his / her "key thought for the week."]

[Watch the clock! Pace the discussion according to the time you have.]

III. Conclusion (5 minutes)

? Does anyone have any concluding comments or questions?

DISCUSSION (70 MINUTES)

I. "The Turning Point" (pages 29-36) (70 minutes)

Introduction

[Have someone read the first two paragraphs: page **29**.]

What Obedience Can Never Accomplish (pages 29-34)

The Problem (page 29)

[Have someone read this section: page 29.]

"Comments, Questions, Clarifications?"

So, what is the problem we all have? [We have all broken the moral will of a holy God]

Notice that all *have* sinned (in the past) and we all *fall* short of God's glory (in the present).

This Problem Could Not Be Worse Than It Is (page 30)

[Have someone read this section: page **30**.]

"Comments, Questions, Clarifications?"

? So, why is our sinfulness such a serious problem? [It condemns us to eternal death]

[Summarize their answers.]

Our sins are capital crimes that call for capital punishment. Therefore, we are all on death row, awaiting God's execution of that sentence. To solve this problem, our sins must be washed away. We must become righteous in God's sight.

The way that is achieved is where the Christian faith separates itself from all other religions. That is because there *is* a righteousness God accepts; but there is also a righteousness He rejects.

First, let's discuss the righteousness He rejects.

The Righteousness that God Rejects (pages 30-31)

[Have 2 read this section: pages **30-31**.]

"Comments, Questions, Clarifications?"

? What kind of righteousness does God reject? [the righteousness of man]

Why God Rejects the Righteousness of Man (page 32)

[Have someone read this section: page **32**.]

"Comments, Questions, Clarifications?"

? Why does God reject the righteousness of man?

[First, because sin has not been punished by death. God does not demand that we try harder to live better. He demands that we die for our sins. Moral crimes are capital crimes in the sight of a holy God; and capital crimes demand capital punishment.

Second, the righteousness of sinful man is flawed / imperfect. God only accepts perfect righteousness.]

[Summarize their answers.]

The Solution to Our Problem (pages 32-33)

[Have someone read this section down to "Dear friends ...," pages **32-33**.]

"Comments, Questions, Clarifications?"

? What is the purpose of the Cross of Christ? [The Cross of Christ is God's Provision of death for our sins by a perfect Substitute]

[Summarize their answers.]

The payment for sins is death. There are two persons that can die for my sins: myself ... or Jesus Christ. But one of us must die. The justice of God demands it.

Furthermore, to be made right in God's sight requires righteousness.

[Have someone read Galatians 2:21.]

I DO NOT NULLIFY THE GRACE OF GOD, FOR IF RIGHTEOUSNESS COMES THROUGH THE LAW, THEN CHRIST DIED NEEDLESSLY. (GALATIANS 2:21)

? What does this verse mean? [If I could be made right in God's sight by my own works of righteousness, then Jesus Christ died for nothing.]

[Summarize their answers.]

- ? What is the only righteousness God will accept? [His Own]
- ? How does one obtain God's righteousness? [through faith in Christ's Death on the Cross for our sins]

[Summarize their answers.]

[For the second time, have someone read from "The problem with ...," (the bottom of page **31**).]

[Now, have the same person read from "Dear friends ...," (middle of page 33).]

"Comments, Questions, Clarifications?"

Summary (page 34)

[Have 2 read this section: page **34**.]

What Obedience Will Accomplish (pages 35-36)

The logical question then becomes, "If obedience does not save me or keep me saved, then why should I be concerned about obeying God?"

Obedience Promotes the Wellbeing of Your Soul (page 35)

[Have someone read this section: page 35.]

"Comments, Questions, Clarifications?"

Throughout our Christian lives, we will be tempted to disobey God's moral laws. (Most of these temptations will involve small matters). We will face many decisions that, if we choose to *obey* God, may result in some form of personal loss. Because we are aware of that, we will be tempted to compromise of our convictions, beliefs formed by the teachings of Scripture.

So, the question we face is this: "What do I want most? God's pleasure or my pleasure? The eternal blessings of God or the temporal blessings of the world?" The time to make this decision is *before* we find ourselves in a situation that tempts us to forfeit our convictions.

? If there is anything in this life that would tempt you to compromise your convictions, what can you do right now to prevent that from happening?

Obedience Exalts the Glory of God's Name (pages 35-36)

[Have someone read this section: pages **35-36**.]

- ? How does an obedient life glorify God? [It is a life that represents the character of God to the world.]
- ? What can we do to cultivate this God-centered perspective?

[Summarize their answers.]

Summary (page 36)

[Have someone read this section: page **36**.]

[Those who have believed and obeyed the revelation they were given have shown they can be trusted to respond rightly to additional Truth. Those who responded with indifference or rebellion have shown they cannot be trusted with more Truth. We are all stewards of Truth.]

[Summarize their answers.]

Prayer plays an important role in our fellowship with the Lord.

? When we pray *before writing an application*, for what are we praying? [guidance / insights to know **how** to apply this truth to our lives.]

[Have someone read "Step Two (a): It Should Be a Personal Commitment," page 40.]

When we write our application, we have been advised to begin with the words "I will" rather than "A believer should."

? Why? ["I" personalizes the application. "Will" makes the application more of a commitment (to obey God in the power of God).]

[Have someone read "Step Two (b): It Should Be Specific," page 40.]

We have also been advised to make our application be as specific as possible.

- ? Why? [Because you have already planned a specific course of action, you are more likely to obey the Lord when faced with the situation.]
- ? What guidelines were given to help us make our application as specific as possible? [Who, What, When, Where]

[Have someone read "Step Two (c): It Should Be Current," page 41.]

Here, we are advised to write an application that addresses a situation we are facing right now (or one we are likely to face).

? Why is that? [We "feel" the need, even the urgency, to make this kind of commitment.]

[Have someone read "Step Three," page 41.]

We believers have good intentions. But we are weak. Only God has the *power* to obey God.

[Have someone read the "Summary," page 41.]

? Does anyone have any comments or questions about the process of writing an application?

[Have someone read from "Examples of the Process" down **to** "Application" (bottom of page **42**).]

[Have someone read from "Application" (bottom of page **42**) to the end of this example (page **44**).]

"Comments, Questions, Clarifications?"

Let's consider a second example of this process of writing an application.

[Have someone read from "II. Your Situation" (page **45**) down **to** "Good Application (Specific)."]

[Have someone read from "Good Application (Specific)" (page **45**) down to the end of this example (page **46**).]

? Are you beginning to see how this is done?

Let's consider one more example of this process of writing an application.

[Have someone read from "III. Your Situation" (page 47) down to the end of this example (page 48).]

"Comments, Questions, Clarifications?"

[Have everyone turn to page 49.]

Part of your assignment for next time will be to write an application based on a key thought from 1st John 5:14-15.

[Have someone read "Your Situation," "Passage," and "Key Thought."]

I know that this is a "made-up" situation for you. So, it's OK to "make up" the details of your application.

Next week I will ask each of you to read your "Who," "What," "When," and "Where" for the application you wrote. Then I will ask you to read the application statement you wrote based on these four "W's." After that, I will evaluate you.

You do not need to write any applications from this coming week's Bible readings. We should first learn *how* to do this before we add this step to our weekly readings.

DISCUSSION (70 MINUTES)

I. Review: "Applying the Scriptures" (10 minutes)

As you read the Bible each day, you have been encouraged to journal your discoveries in the form of (what we are calling) "key thoughts."

After recording your key thought for the day, the Holy Spirit will often "prompt" you to respond to that truth in some way. So, last week we discussed how to turn this Godgenerated motivation into a deliberate course of action.

Step One: We said the first step is to pray. "Ask the Lord to show you how to apply this truth to your life."

Step Two: Then we learned how to develop a *specific* plan of obedience.

- We were to begin our plan with a personal commitment: "I will."
- Then, to make our commitment specific, we were to identify four "W's": Who, What, When, and Where.
- We were encouraged to apply this truth to a situation we were facing, or were likely to face, and not one that was theoretical.

Step Three: Finally, after writing out our application, we were encouraged to invest some time in prayer. "Father, please motivate and empower me to obey Your will."

This is how one prepares himself to obey God's Word.

II. Application Assignment (page 49) (45 minutes)

For this meeting you were to have written an application for 1st John 5:14-15.

[Have someone read "Your Situation," "Passage," and "Key Thought," page 49.]

I would like to ask each of you to read your "Who," "What," "When" "Where" for the application you wrote. Then, please read the "I will" statement you wrote based on these four "W's."

After each of you finish, I will evaluate you.

[This evaluation may be challenging for you, the facilitator, since some of their applications may be quite general. You must tactfully "stretch" them to make their applications as specific and current as possible.]

- [Did his application begin with the words "I will"?]
- [Did he mention a specific who?]
- [Did he mention a specific what?]
- [Did he mention a specific when?]
- [Did he mention a specific where?]
- [Did his application sound current or likely to happen ... or did it sound too "whenever"?]
- ? Do you have any final comments or questions concerning the mechanics of writing an application?

- The makeup of this small band of believers could consist of your *family members*: you, your wife, and your children (if you think they are old enough to participate in something like this).
- Or you might form a small group made up entirely of *other believers* you know who are interested in maturing spiritually.
- And, of course, this small group itself could continue meeting together.
 There would be no new skills to learn. You would simply continue doing what you have been doing.

- Ask how his application is going.
- Ask how his times of fellowship with the Lord are going.
- Remind him that you are praying for him.

At the beginning of our meeting next week, I will ask if anyone would like to voluntarily describe how his application went this past week.
